Police Unity Tour 2019:

A group of officers and staff from Wiltshire Police have today begun a 180-mile cycle ride in memory of police officers who have died in the line of duty.

Deputy Chief Constable Paul Mills is leading the group of 15 cyclists and six support staff on the three-day journey from Police Headquarters in Devizes to the National Memorial Arboretum in Staffordshire.

They will then be joined by more than 400 cyclists from police forces across the UK for a memorial service on Sunday (28/07/19).

DCC Mills, who will be joined by Chief Constable Kier Pritchard on the second day of the ride, said: "This is the seventh year of the UK Police Unity Tour and I am honoured to once again lead the Wiltshire chapter on this challenge, which always proves to be an emotional and humbling experience for everyone who takes part.

"Every year we are reminded of the tremendous sacrifice given by so many of our colleagues from across the country, and here in Wiltshire it is an opportunity to reflect on the life of one of our own - PC Dan Cooper, who sadly died while on duty on 1 February 2010.

"Now, more than ever, it is important that all police officers and staff, as well as the wider public, acknowledge the ever-present dangers and risks of modern-day policing, and pay tribute to those who have lost their lives while protecting the public."

The purpose of the UK Police Unity Tour is to raise funds for Care of Police Survivors, a UK charity dedicated to helping the families of police officers who have lost their lives on duty.

Last year the Wiltshire chapter raised more than £8,000 for COPS, while the total across the country was more than £200,000.







Crime Prevention Advice:



Wiltshire as a whole is a rural county with numerous beauty spot/sights for tourists and visitors to explore. The isolation of these areas make thefts from cars quite common, especially in the summer months.

ADVICE:

- Before you leave home, think about what you need and leave any unnecessary items of value at home
- Make sure you do not leave documents which have your personal details on in your vehicle.
- Try to park in sign-posted parking areas
- Be cautious about parking your car in isolation. Thieves can be put off when other people are around
- Do not leave anything in your vehicle. A jacket or coat left behind may be of very little value to you, but a thief may think it has been used to hide a laptop or handbag and will break into your vehicle to find out
- Take items with you rather than locking them in the boot, you can't be sure who has seen you
- Do not leave your sat-nav in your vehicle and don't forget to remove the cradle and wipe the sucker marks from your windscreen
- Remember to shut all windows and sunroofs and lock all doors. Activate the alarm and immobilizer
- Make use of any security products you might have such as steering locks
- Whilst enjoying the sights make sure you keep your bag and possessions with you
- Register all your valuables on the Immobilize website

Ready your defenses to protect your castle. Make life hard for those who want to help themselves to what is not theirs.

The use of prickly plants as defensive ...planting creates a physical and psychological barrier and has proven to be a successful deterrent.

Consider trimming back any plants and hedges at the front of your property to no higher than one meter to remove hiding places for burglars.

Lock tools, valuables and ladders away securely so they can't be used to break into your property.



Following a number of reports in the last couple of days in and around Marlborough, please read the following information and pass on to your neighbors who may not have access to or use social media

Most people that call at your home will be genuine. But sometimes, people turn up unannounced, with the intention of distracting you and tricking their way into your home to steal money or valuables or sell you something you do not want or need.

These types of people are often referred to as 'Nottingham Knockers', 'distraction burglars', 'bogus callers' or 'cold callers'.

If offenders are trying to sell you something on your doorstep, often cleaning products, they have been known to claim they are part of a rehabilitation scheme or similar arranged by probation services. This is not the case.

People should never feel pressured into buying something on their doorstep, whether it is goods or a service. We would urge people to contact the police if they feel threatened or intimidated.

If you have elderly or vulnerable neighbors it might be worth popping over to check they are okay if you have had cold callers visit your house.

An official visitor will always arrange an appointment with you before and will not turn up unannounced.

Our advice will always be to not open the door to anyone you don't know or are not expecting. Always check by using a spy-hole or look through a window.
